

"An autism diagnosis for your child is devastating. In the beginning, you can't help but see all the things your child isn't able to do and you can't help but wonder if there will be any normal kids things they will be able to learn to do. Children at one end of the spectrum are perceived as incapable because communication is a factor. On the other end, children are perceived as not being disabled at all, because they seem too normal. This book and the series to come, I think, will be helpful for anyone who finds themselves dealing with autism. Parents will be able to see that there is a type of normalcy out there for their little ones. 

